Lesson 6: Grumpy Frog Story

WE ARE LEARNING: Why it is important to say sorry.

BORIS ASKS:Can the children list reasons to say sorry?RESOURCES:Grumpy Frog by Ed Vere (Puffin, 2017) (You can find a reading on YouTube if you don't have a copy)

Read the story, 'Grumpy Frog' by Ed Vere to the children. After reading, ask the following questions to discuss the story:

- What happens when Grumpy Frog doesn't win?
- Look at the page where Rabbit offers to be Frog's friend. How does Frog upset Rabbit?
- What happens when Frog says sorry at the end of the story?
- What might have happened if Frog hadn't said sorry?

Talk about why it is important to say sorry. Ask the children to share a time when they have needed to say sorry. Ask them what happened after they said sorry. Explain that saying sorry (and meaning it) is a way of mending a friendship when someone has been upset.

Boris says, 'Saying sorry means we can carry on having fun with our friends.'



HERE ARE SOME WAYS IN WHICH THIS RELATES TO THE CURRICULUM:

ELG: PSED - MANAGING FEELINGS AND BEHAVIOUR:

22-36 months: Aware that some actions can hurt or harm others

30-50months: Aware of own feelings, and knows that some actions and words can hurt others' feelings

40-60 months: Understands that their own actions affect other people, for example, becomes upset or tries to comfort another child when they realise they have upset them

ELG: Children talk about how they and others show feelings, talk about their own and others' behaviour, and its consequences, and know that some behaviour is unacceptable
